The local farm equipment dealers set up an award four years ago to go to a member of our Chapter who does the best job in farm safety. The dealers purchased a plaque that may be used for twelve years and the winner each year has his name engraved on the plaque and is made the award at our annual Parent and Son Banquet.

OUR SUPERVISED FARMING PROGRAM

Our Chapter has a farming program that we as members are very proud of, it consists of the following. Twenty-one boys have 46 Beef Cows, 15 boys have 31 Beef Heifers, 5 boys have 7 Fattening Cattle, 42 boys have 83 Sows, 6 boys have 7 Milk Cows, 3 boys have 7 Dairy Heifers, 13 boys have 172 Ewes. The Field Crops that we have are: 41 boys with 658 acres of Corn, 25 boys with 474 acres of Soybeans, 11 boys with 120 acres of Wheat, 4 boys with 40 acres of Oats, 1 boy with 5 acres of Rye, 6 boys with 71 acres of Milo. We are very proud of the way all the teams did at Maryville. There were many schools taking part, and it was very evident that we were well represented.

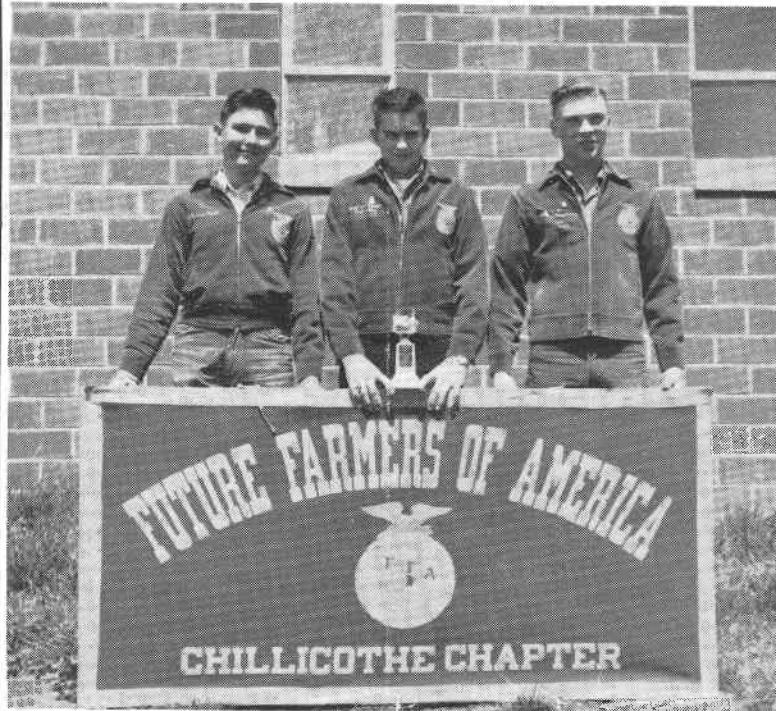

STATE CONTESTS

We are very proud of the ratings won by our Chapter this year at the state contest held in Columbia. Seven teams went to district contests and out of this number five received high enough ratings to go to state. We feel that a great deal of credit goes to our advisor for his tireless efforts in helping us prepare for the contest.



The FARM MECHANICS TEAM received the highest rating in the district contest and went on to win first place in the state. George Bauer received the highest individual rating. Other members on the team were James Meservey and Melvin Hall with each placing in the upper 10. All three members received a I rating.

The MEATS TEAM received a II rating with James Meservey winning a II rating and Earl Van Eaton and Lawrence Loney each a III rating.

The DAIRY PRODUCTS TEAM . . . in the district contest received second high and in state got a I rating with Forrest Darr, Chuck Leffler, and Paul Steele each receiving I ratings.

The FIELD CROPS TEAM . . . composed of Richard Hargrave and Eddie Mast who won I ratings, and Wayne Boone at II. The team as a whole received a I rating.

The SOILS TEAM . . . entering district and state contests was composed of Jim Bonderer, Larry Grimes and Fred Van Eaton, also made a good showing.

SHOP

In the past year there have been many improvements made in our shop. Some of these improvements are: asphalt work area outside the shop; a wall between the shop and old classroom removed to make more space in shop; gas heaters installed; wash sink; new work bench, and many new tools.

The Vocational Agriculture II class painted the walls and tools in the shop and also put up new

tool boards for all tools. In general they completely remodeled the shop.

In the past year there were 66 projects completed in shop. Some of these are: wagon beds, loading chutes, farrowing crates, feeders, feed troughs, gates, mineral feeders, garden tractor, mail box stand, self waterers, saw horses, tractor feed box, and the repairing as well as painting of other equipment.

SHERROW, AMERICAN FARMER DEGREE

Last fall the Chillicothe F.F.A. chapter attended the 29th National Convention held in Kansas City. One of the highlights of the convention was the awarding of the American Farmer Degree. Each year one out of every thousand F.F.A. members are eligible for this degree. This year our chapter was honored by having one of its members, Bob Sherrow, receive this high honor. To receive this degree one must have an outstanding program of work. One must be active in community and church activities.

Instituti'l On-farm Training

Veterans Farm Training has been offered in our Vocational Agriculture Program since 1946. Over 350 Veterans have been enrolled in the school since its beginning.

Mr. Harvey Keith, the instructor, has a B.S. Degree from the College of Agriculture, University of Missouri, and is a qualified Vocational Agriculture Instructor.

The Adult Program

Our Vocational Agriculture Department serves a broad function in our school aside from training high school students in the different aspects of farming and agriculture. The department also offered instruction in farming to a total of 48 young farmers and Veterans during the year.

The members of the Young Farmers' Group have been a permanent organization for 4 years. The past year they attended night classes for 15 sessions. The group is made up of former all day students of Vocational Agriculture and other young men. Ben Wood Jones is president and C. S. Jones is secretary.

NORTHWEST DISTRICT MEETING

Soon after school was dismissed last spring plans were being made for the meeting of the Northwest District. This was to be the first meeting of this type held in this district. The Chillicothe chapter consented to be host, even though they knew the great responsibilities and never-ending work that must go into such a meeting. Work began many weeks before July 5th, the date set for the meeting now given the title of The Northwest District of Missouri Associa-

tion of the Future Farmers of America. Posters had to be made for the store windows, invitations sent out, speakers and guests decided upon, a parade arranged, a reception planned, and a sign painted to be hung across Washington Street welcoming the National President.

A parade was planned and as the National officers arrived they were shown around in convertibles. As they passed the courthouse the city mayor presented John Haid, the National President, a golden key to the city. From 4:30 to 6:30 a reception was held for the F.F.A. boys to afford them an opportunity of meeting the National Officers.

The banquet was held with our own officers taking charge of the meeting. Jerry Litton, National Secretary, was the master of ceremonies and John Haid was the main speaker. Several other National officers were present as well as officers from the Missouri, Kansas, and Iowa Associations.
